Arkansas Department of Education (ADE):

Special Education

If a parent or other interested party feels a child needs special education to receive benefit in the educational setting, then they can send a written request to the principal of the child's school, requesting a referral conference.

The "Special Education and Related Services Procedural Requirements and Program Standards" manual states that the purposes of the regulations are "To ensure that all children with disabilities in the State of Arkansas have available to them a free appropriate public education that emphasizes special education and related services designed to meet their unique needs and prepare them for further education, employment and independent living".

The manual "Special Education Eligibility Criteria and Program Guidelines for Children with Disabilities Ages 3 - 21" includes the following disability categories: Autism, Deaf-Blindness, Hearing Impairment (including Deafness), Emotional Disturbance, Mental Retardation, Multiple Disabilities, Orthopedic Impairment, Other Health Impairment, Specific Learning Disability, Speech or Language Impairment, Traumatic Brain Injury and Visual Impairment (including Blindness). For children 3 - 5 there is no Emotional Disturbance or Mental Retardation, however, for that age Noncategorical is added.

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The services may include educational services, speech/language therapy, audiology services, interpreters for students who are deaf or hard of hearing, occupational therapy, physical therapy, services for students with visual impairments and/or adapted physical education. These services are provided based on the individual needs of the student that are determined by the educational committee for each student. The educational committee then writes the Individualized Education Program (IEP) for the student. The IEP is a document that details what services will be received by the student and in what setting.

For the provision of an integrated system of public mental health care and substance abuse prevention and treatment services to Arkansas residents, the DBHS divides the state into 15 service areas. Each service area is served by a designated community mental health center. Substance Abuse Treatment Centers (DBHS)

The Office of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention (OADAP) is part of DBHS and provides alcohol and drug treatment services through contracts with local

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programs. Services include detoxification, residential, outpatient services. Alcohol and drug treatment services for pregnant and parenting women are provided through Special Women's Services programs.

Payment source for Services: Substance is not a reimbursable service by Medicaid. Some programs take insurance and private pay. The majority of funding for alcohol and drug treatment services comes from the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant. For clients to be able to access payment for services under the Block Grant they must meet the financial requirements based upon their income for the last 12 months.

Accessing Alcohol and Drug Treatment Services: OADAP treatment areas are divided into 13 Service Areas to serve the state. Individual seeking services should contact the program in their Service Area. No referral is required. After locating appropriate area of the state you need, find the service on-line and to access services call the treatment center for admission.

The Arkansas State Hospital, sponsored by DBHS, is a psychiatric inpatient treatment facility for those individuals with mental or emotional disorders. The hospital includes 90 adult acute care inpatient beds; an 80-bed forensic treatment services program which offers assistance to circuit courts throughout the state; 16 adolescent acute inpatient beds; and 16 adolescent sex offender beds.

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The Arkansas Health Center is a 350-bed long-term care psychiatric nursing facility, which serves the needs of elderly Arkansans with disabilities who require specialized services and programs not generally available through community nursing homes.

DHS Developmental Disabilities Services (DDS)

The Division of Developmental Disabilities Services (DDS) has adopted the service delivery philosophy of "Service Options". Service Options are designed so that individuals and their families can have choices in selecting appropriate services in their local community. This philosophy will allow each individual to maximize his or her abilities while enjoying a quality of life commensurate with those abilities. It will also prevent an individual from being forced to access more expensive and intrusive services.

To access Developmental Disabilities Services, contact your county Department of Human Services office to apply.

DDS provides programs and services through the following:

DDS COMMUNITY SUPPORT SERVICES SECTION provides a variety of services, including day programming (early intervention, preschool), respite care, family support, follow-along, case management, integrated supports, and community integration companions. Individuals receiving services in the local community receive supervision from trained service providers in the most appropriate setting. Service providers must meet specified standards and criteria through either DDS licensure or certification. Community Support Services includes Field Services, First Connections (Part C Early Intervention), Early Childhood, Therapeutic Services, and Integrated Services that provide wraparound support to persons with dual diagnoses (developmental disabilities and mental illness).

Early Intervention and Early Childhood Services for Children Birth to Five Years of Age: The First Connections Program (through Parts B & C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act-IDEA) is responsible for the planning, development, and implementation of statewide services for infants and toddlers (0 to 36 months of age). Currently, this unit provides services for approximately 3,000 infants and toddlers. Eleven (11) Developmental Specialists and two (2) Developmental Specialists Managers provide intake, service option presentations, individual social history development, referrals, transition to public school, individual service coordination (case management), assistance and monitoring of early intervention/early childhood contracts, obtaining and maintaining client data tracking information and case notes. Early Intervention/ Early Childhood services include the following 16 federally mandated components: identification; evaluation; procedural safeguards; case management; speech, physical and occupational therapies; audiological services; developmental therapy; family training, health/medical services; nutrition
